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#### ISOQOL LEADERSHIP LESSONS

It was an incredible honor and a vote of confidence from so many that I respect to receive this year's emerging leader award. The legacy ISOQOL has established in Donna Lamping's name speaks to the camaraderie, respect, and top-notch science which ISOQOL embodies.

As a newly minted emerging leader, I've been asked to extend leadership advice to ISOQOL new investigators. A daunting task to be sure, but I'll give it a shot. At ISOQOL conferences I have been incredibly impressed with the enthusiasm and ideas that students and new investigators have for the field and for the organization. The trick has always been in taking that excitement and find ways to turn it into results — it can be hard to figure out how to get started. Below are three tips to help you out.

Tip #1: Get involved. It doesn't have to be a big task, just something where you are able to interact with others, help out, and show that you are interested in the organization and the field. This gives you an opportunity to learn how things get done, what this organization is all about, and perhaps how you can make it even better. Special interest groups often have a few projects going on throughout the year and are a great way to work on something you are interested in.

Tip #2: Don't be afraid to suggest new ideas. If at any point you are

walking around at the ISOQOL conference and think, "this is the best conference I've ever been to, if only [your cool idea here]," there is probably someone who would be interested in hearing about it. I have pitched a lot of ideas to a lot of people over the years, and it's to the organization's credit that I have always been encouraged to go for it. Some things have worked really well, like the Tricks of the Trade panel, others, well...not so much. Of course, if you suggest an idea, chances are that you will need to be the one to put it into action. This leads us to my last piece of advice.

Tip #3: Be ready to put in the time. Seems obvious, right? Getting involved with an organization like this can consume a lot of your time. However, it's worth it to be able to make changes you are passionate about, while working with fun people who know what HRQOL stands for, right? (Answer: Yes!)

Perhaps it's the size, the focus on interesting research that very few others really think about much, or the sing-a-longs — but ISOQOL has always been a conference I look forward to. This is a tight-knit but inclusive community where motivation and involvement is recognized and appreciated. I encourage all new investigators to get involved and continue to make this organization something special.

#### NEW INVESTIGATORS - HOW TO WRITE A GOOD ABSTRACT

As the deadline for the ISOQOL conference submissions is approaching, most of us are probably already thinking about our abstracts. The aim of the abstract is to describe your research in a limited number of words, while trying to create a clear picture of your design and results. Writing an abstract is one of the biggest challenges for researchers, especially for those in the earlier stages of their career.

The basic format of an abstract includes an Introduction, Methods, Results and Conclusions/Discussion section. The introduction covers the general topic, the key research question, and the gap in the literature this study aims to address. It should answer the question "why should I bother reading this abstract?". When writing an abstract you want to build a story, where each sentence follows the previous one. Your introduction provides the "great idea".

The methods section is meant to explain how researchers answered their question. It is here that you describe your design and analyses. Unless the Methods of the study are complex or unusual, a few sentences can cover the basic information. The results section should mirror the

methods section and clearly respond to the research question, as stated earlier. It is here that you present your main outcomes. Keep it light and don't report too many statistical results. Make it attractive to readers.

Finally, in the Conclusions, results should be interpreted and implications should be discussed. Try to incorporate both the clinical and scientific value of your research. What do these findings mean and how are they going to change your research field? If written clearly, it will provide the answer to the question: "why should I bother reading this abstract?".

Last, but definitely not least, the title. Especially for posters, the title is the first thing conference attendees read. Make it informative. If possible, try to incorporate the main results in you introduction, such as: "Design A shows that B increases C in patients with disease D".

Below you will find a few tips that might prove useful when preparing an abstract. Good luck with the abstract submission process!

 First, review the official guidelines for the abstract (submission process).

- Go through your paper for which you are writing the abstract and identify the key sentences you want to use. This can be your first draft.
- In this first draft, don't worry too much about word limit. Later on you can edit your abstract again and again, going through every single sentence and word and questioning their necessity.
- Write small sentences and choose between the active or passive voice.
- You cannot write down everything, keep only the key information.
- Ask a colleague who is less familiar with your study to read the abstract.
- Always proofread for grammar/ punctuation. A sloppy abstract is usually perceived by reviewers as sloppy research.
- Authors whose native tongue is not English should have their abstract edited by a native English speaker before submitting.
- Have fun!



#### **NEW SEER-MHOS DATA AVAILABLE!**

New data from the Surveillance, Epidemiology and End Results-Medicare Health Outcomes Survey (SEER-MHOS) linked data set are now publicly available. This population-based surveillance resource, recently expanded to include MHOS data collected from 1998-2011, allows researchers to investigate the health status and health-related quality of life of older adult (ages 65 and over) Medicare Advantage enrollees with and without a cancer diagnosis.

SEER-MHOS is a partnership of the National Cancer Institute and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

#### CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR THE ISOQOL BOARD OF DIRECTORS

All ISOQOL members are encouraged to submit recommendations for the positions of President-elect, Secretary-Treasurer and Board Members (3). All nominees are required to submit a C.V. and personal statement regarding their vision for ISOOOL. Final nominations will not be due until March 2014. Please consider nominating yourself or another ISOQOL member for one of these important positions. If you have any questions regarding the responsibilities of the positions, please contact Rebecca Brandt, ISOQOL Executive Director rbrandt@isoqol.org or Bryce Reeve, PhD, Nominations Committee Chairperson bbreeve@ email.unc.edu.

In addition to the duties listed below, all board members are expected to attend two face-to-face meetings; one just prior to the Annual Conference and a second mid-year meeting. Expenses to travel to the Board meeting not coinciding with the Annual Conference are covered by ISOQOL. Two conference calls are also required, along with any agreed-upon project work.

#### PRESIDENT-ELECT

The President-elect will assist the President as requested; shall chair meetings in the absence of the President and fulfill other duties as requested; and, will prepare for the duties and responsibilities of the President. The President-elect will chair the Nominations Committee in the year in which there is no Immediate Past-President on the Executive Committee. As a member of the Executive Committee, the President-elect is expected to participate in a monthly teleconference and be available for regular e-mail exchange.

The President-elect will serve a oneyear term (2014-2015) beginning in October 2014. The President-elect will assume the Presidency at the 2015 Annual Conference and will serve a two-year term as President (2015-2017). Upon completion of the term as President, a one-year term as Past-President will be served (2017-2018) on the Board of Directors and as a member of the Executive Committee.

#### **SECRETARY-TREASURER**

To continue development and implementation of policies of fiscal responsibility that ensure ISOQOL's ability to implement its mission and strategic plan, and to participate as a member of the Executive committee with the same objectives. This is a three-year term (2014-2017), non renewable.

Prior to the mid-year Board meeting (typically held between April and May), the Secretary-Treasurer will carefully review the society's financial audit and identify any issues and/or trends that need the Board's attention. He/She will then submit the accountant's report and summary at the mid-year Board meeting. Prior to the annual conference, the Secretary-Treasurer will develop next year's budget with the Executive Director. He/She will present budget for approval by entire board.

The Secretary-Treasurer commits to reviewing the financial statements of the society on a regular basis and to be available to sign checks on behalf of the society in accordance with policy.

#### **BOARD MEMBER**

Actively promote the mission of ISOQOL and foster ISOQOL's development through strategic planning, policy making, development, and critical evaluation of ISOQOL's activities. Board members shall serve a term of three years and may not succeed themselves.

#### **Duties of a Board member are:**

- To prepare for and attend Board meetings for the purpose of ensuring the good governance of ISOQOL.
- 2. To represent ISOQOL members, Special Interest Groups, local chapters or geographic clusters of members at Board meetings, including the raising of new business as required.
- 3. To undertake, between Board meetings, various administrative and research tasks determined by the Board.
- To comment on and contribute to the discussion of documents provided at the Board meetings.
- 5. It is generally expected that Board members take an active role in the annual scientific meeting, for example by acting as peer reviewers of abstracts, chairs of plenary or parallel sessions, judges for new investigator awards, or participants in the mentor–mentee initiative.
- To volunteer for task forces and special projects to promote ISOQOL.
- 7. To participate in activities to raise funds and resources for the Society's activities.
