Issues Requiring Board Attention:

I think the biggest issue our SIG struggles with is engagement of the membership and what type of engagement to do: social or project-based or a little of both. We submitted a survey to the membership and only 15/173 members participated (8.67%). I think there are two opinions about what is the role of a SIG. Is it for social interaction or is to "accomplish" things? It will be helpful for me to finally attend the SIG Council meeting to understand what is asked of the SIGs from the perspective of the ISOQOL leadership. As the SIG Council Meeting 2020 was cancelled and I (Amy Cizik) did not participate in the 2019 so as a chair I feel disconnected of the role of the SIGs with the larger organization. Our membership (15 people) stated they want to collaborate on research projects, but my guess is these are the same people who do engage and probably were the same core group of members who worked on the COVID paper with Manraj or who have helped and supported the workshop and symposium abstract submissions.
